The open house is your chance to see the progress to date and the work which remains to be done on the project before the mighty Fisher/Orbits Wurlitzer plays again. Perhaps you'll discover where your particular talents can be utilized to help get the iob done faster.

The present entrance to the Senate is through the alley off Cicotte Avenue at the west side of the theater. The area will be well lighted.

DID YOU KNOW that the Fisher/Orbits Wurlitzer about to be installed in the club's new headquarters is among the eight largest Wurlitzers ever built, and that this 34 rank giant is one of the twelve Largest theater organs of any make. So says organ enthusiast Floyd Bunt, who makes a hobby of collecting such facts.

According to Floyd's statistics, more than 2,200 pipe organs were built by Wurlitzer, of which only about 200 were larger than 10 ranks. The 2/6 and 2/7 were the most popular models.

The seven Wurlitzers which exceeded the Fisher's 34 ranks were the 4/58 in New York's Radio City Music Hall, the 4/36 in the Detroit Fox and its four identical companions, and the 4/35 in the Denver City Auditorium.

Among the theater organs of other makes which were larger than the Fisher Wurlitzer were a 60 rank Robert Morton in Los Angeles, the 56 rank Kimball in the Atlantic City Ballroom, the 42 rank Moller in the Atlanta Fox, and the 62 rank Barton in the Chicago Stadium.
