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## artin Ellis in Concert Sunday, May 12, 2013 3:00 p.m.

The Detroit Theater Organ Society is pleased to present for the first time at the Senate Theater Martin Ellis of Indianapolis.

Martin Ellis is a concert artist that bridges the boundaries between traditional classical and theatre organ. Equally proficient in both playing styles Mr. Ellis performs on organs of distinction in the United States and abroad, offering a contemporary perspective to music enthusiasts of all genres.

In his home town of Indianapolis, Indiana, Martin has appeared with the

Indianapolis Symphony Orchestra and was the featured organist to play the premier concert of Saint Saens' "Organ" Symphony No. 3 on the newly installed pipe organ in ISO's Hilbert Circle Theatre. Since that time, he has been a featured performer in the Indianapolis Symphony's renowned "Yuletide Celebration" in 2009, and continues to perform on numerous classical and pops concerts featuring organ and symphony fostering new and innovative ideas in the use of organ with or-This past Christchestra. mas, Martin was the featured

organist with the Jacksonville Symphony Orchestra in Jacksonville, Florida, on their famous Holiday Pops Series. Mr. Ellis has been a featured artist at conventions of The American Guild of Organists, The Organ Historical Society, and The American Theatre Organ Society.

In addition to concert activities, Mr. Ellis serves as Organist and Associate Director of Music for North United Methodist Church in Indianapolis where he presides over the church's three pipe organs, including the 4-manual, 76rank Kimball / Reynolds organ in the sanctuary. Addi-

tionally, he is one of the house organists for the wellknown Sanfilippo Estate of Barrington, Illinois which houses the world's largest 5manual, 80 rank theatre organ as well as the world's largest automatic musical instrument collection. For well over a decade now Martin has worked as an arranger and at the keyboard with the renowned Indianapolis Children's Choir.

Martin records and performs as a member of "Trio Con Brio." Along with artists Donna Parker and Jonas Nordwall, the "Trio" gained its fame by adapting classical, orchestral, and popular music for performance with three organs simultaneously. Along with an active recording schedule, "Trio" performs on many of the country's high-profile organ installations.

We are sure that you will enjoy the artistry of Martin Ellis at the Senate Theater's Mighty Wurlitzer. The doors will open at 2:00 p.m. with the concert starting at 3:00 p.m.

## enovation Report

We have received more news regarding our new (and large–40'x20') movie screen.

The company making our new screen has informed us that the date for shipping the screen from France has been moved back to June 21st. After it arrives in the states, it should take roughly thirty days to arrive by truck. We have been so anxious for its arrival, but it seems we are all going to have to wait a little while longer.

Not all is bad, however. It will give us more time to prepare for its arrival. I have met with two different contractors. It is going to take one contractor to build a small scaffolding from the door to the stage to bring the one-ton forty-foot screen in. Then, it will take another contractor to bring in scaffolding so that we can get the winches in place from the rafters in



order to raise the heavy screen. But it's all good, as they say. Everyone is in place standing by for the preparation.

### uster Keaton's "The General" Accompanied by Dennis Scott on the Wurlitzer


The Month of May brings a special screening of Buster Keaton's "The General," accompanied live on the Wurlitzer Theater Pipe Organ by Dennis Scott.

This epic film, one of Keaton's best, is also one of his most expensive. Almost three-quarters of a million dollars was spent on the making of this movie, which includes the destruction of a steam train!

The film will be accompanied by renowned organist Dennis Scott.

Dennis Scott is an internationally known silent film organist. He first began accompanying silent films in the 1970s, when he started playing theatre pipe organs installed in pizza parlors in the Midwest and on the West coast. He would accompany a couple of "tworeel" comedies every evening. His style has been compared to that of his legendary mentor, the late John Muri, who recorded numerous silent film scores for Blackhawk Films. Suzanne Lloyd, granddaughter of the comic genius Harold Lloyd, dubbed Dennis the "Master of Magic Notes,"

He is house organist at Chicago's historic Music Box Theatre, playing weekend intermissions, the annual Sing-Along of Sound of Music, the annual Music Box Christmas Sing-A-Long, several themed film festivals, special events, and the acclaimed Second Saturday Silent Cinema Series, which was named Best New Film Series of 2011 by Chicago



Magazine and Best Matinee Film Series of 2012 by the Chicago Reader.

Currently, Dennis is recording theatre organ scores for a large collection of Mack Sennett films which will be sold as a DVD box set in the near future.

Dennis is the official organist for the International Buster Keaton Society and accompanies silent Keaton films every year for their convention, held in Muskegon, Michigan, where Buster spent much of his childhood. He played for two seasons of monthly silent film presentations at the Oriental Theatre in Milwaukee, and was a regular performer for the Sound of Silents Film Festival in Three Oaks, Michigan.

Dennis is co-founder and former President of the Silent Film Society of Chicago. From 2000 through 2010, he was featured in the SFSC;s annual Silent Simmer Film Festival. He was a staff organist at the Tivoli Theatre in Downers Grove, Illinois for nine years, where he became organist and music coordinator for Our Town Productions, an award -winning children's theatre company. He recorded a CD with Chicago's very popular West End Jazz

Band, recreating the brief era of the "marriage" of the theatre organ and the jazz bands of the 1920s and 30s. For a number o years, he played the organ background for the annual live radio broadcast of "It's a Wonderful Life" at the Rialto Theatre in Joliet, Illinois.

Buster Keaton on the screen and Dennis at the organ is a combination that is sure to thrill everyone at the Senate. Tickets for this special presentation are only \$10 each. Please note that this movie presentation is not a normal part of the DTOS concert series and is not included with memberships in DTOS.

# 💭 estroom Update

Plans are moving ahead for the addition of first floor restrooms.

We have a preliminary drawing, done by Andy Coatley, of a possible layout that would give us much needed restrooms that are handicap accessible without having to climb the stairs. Dave Masserant used surveyors orange spray paint to outline on the ground where the new addition would be after Andy helped measure off the site, and where the addition would adjoin our existing building.

The piece of property that the addition would be built on is the parcel just to the west of the theatre. Years ago it was where the Senate Coney Island used to be located. The Coney Island burned to the ground and the property sat vacant for a long time. We purchased the property some years ago, with the hopes of someday building an additional structure on it, to enhance the use of our theatre.

Thanks to some generous donations, we are moving

ahead with these plans. It will take a lot of cutting of red tape at city hall as well as some more money, but we think it will be well worth the effort and expense. The new addition will give patrons approximately five stalls in the women's bathroom and three stalls and two urinals in the men's bathroom. There would also be some much needed additional storage space. This drawing is not "final" but it certainly is a workable design. There would be an opening cut into the


wall of the "outer lobby" to allow access into the new structure.

When the Senate Theater was built, handicap accessible restrooms were not the norm, as seen by our current situation. These days' current building codes etc. require them. We are pretty excited to be able to actually think about breaking ground on this much anticipated project.



Above-wind lines stuffed into crawl spaces below the theater


