A large boom truck was brought in to unload the screen, which was then raised up and over the fence.





The boom truck was also used to assist in getting the screen through the doorway and into the theater. The most difficult part was placing the screen on the conveyor and moving it into the building, but with all of the male expertise and the help of a pallet jack, it finally made its way to the stage.

more men, with two working in the attic, and two working on the stage.


As you can see, there was a large amount of lumbar used to encase the screen for shipping. We are looking for someone to be able to break this up and haul it away. It sure would make great fire-

place wood. Do we have any volunteers?

Now that the screen has been delivered and loaded on the srage, the bill is now due. With the total cost of all the equipment, man power, and the steel pipe that supports the screen, the total amount due came to \$2,460.00. We

received a donation check for \$500.00, which certainly helped put a dent in the bill, but we sure could use a little more help. Anyone with a few extra dollars that they could use to help with the delivery and installation expense? Your help is greatly appreciated!

We are excited to soon be able to use the new large screen and hope that it will increase our audience, which will in turn bring in the much needed revenue. Again, thank you to all of you that have brought us this far!



To the left is the most recent version of the proposed layout of the new lower-level restrooms to be built at the Senate Theater. Several changes were recently made, which include:

- Upper floor added for meeting space
- Double-width stairs
- Slightly-larger footprint
- New dual-level water fountain
- Three-station sink, as needed if we wish to add more items to our conession stand
- A "slop sink" for cleaning and maintenance

The next step in the restroom process is to solicit bids from architectural firms to move to the next step on making the lower-level restrooms a reality.



agtime & Boogie Woogie Concert Coming

Sunday, September 29, 2013 3:00 p.m.

It's a match! Two highly regarded Ragtime and Boogie-Woogie pianists (yes, pianists) are coming to the Senate on Sunday, September 29, at 3:00 p.m.

Bring a friend to this special concert opportunity. Come expecting endless enthusiasm, blazing handwork, as well as some tunes and early blues with rich melodies and chords, all presented in an engaging manner including stories about Ragtime and Boogie Woogie music with a little humor anecdotally incorporated into this historic presentation.

We can all remember when Marvin Hamlisch's ragtime music score for "The

Sting" won him an Academy Award for music from this era. Now you can experience it live in the historic and personal Senate Theatre. Refresh your memory of this nearly forgotten music.

BOB MILNE

Bob Milne specializes in this music style that developed America in the late 1800's and early 1900's. Although Bob Milne comes from a classical background, having excelled as a French horn virtuoso at the Eastman School of Music, he is completely self-taught as a pianist, playing totally by ear. When he took saloon pianoplaying on the side, he

discovered what fun entertaining his listeners could be, and how naturally it came to him. Early on in this new career, Bob became fascinated by the Ragtime music found on nearby player pianos, and how listeners enjoyed it.

Bob Milne's "internship" lasted 25 years, usually playing in the Detroit area at venues such as the Dakota Inn Rathskeller, Woodbridge Tavern, and many more. He has even written a book on these experiences, The Journeyman Piano Player.

Bob naturally progressed to the concert stage, acknowledged by many as one of the best pianists of our time. He is now constantly performing across the country (and sometimes beyond) from concert halls to festivals, and everything in between, and still having fun with his audiences exhibiting ballistic speed as well as subtle harmonies.

K n o w n a s a "Ragtimist" (a term he coined), Bob Milne quickly made himself a dedicated student and presenter of this true American musical form, having acquired both a vast repertoire of tunes and extensive knowledge of their origins. In 2004, Bob Milne was designated a National Treasure by the Librarian of Congress, and the concert that he performed there is

now part of the National Record of American Music.

These histories and the stories of the piano players who were playing them are anecdotally incorporated into Bob Milne's presentations. Bob also teaches music history at Florida Atlantic University every winter, and conducts a Music Retreat in Lapeer, MI each September.

It comes as no surprise that the Library of Congress designated Bob Milne a "National Treasure" when they documented his expertise for future generations, and that the U.S. State Department has utilized him as a "Musical Ambassador" in Japan and Switzerland.

Forssen states: "He has so much music stored in his fingers that he is able to play and talk at the same time, giving little clinics on technique, explaining how ragtime was old on the guitar before it was new on the piano – and how, during a span approaching 100 years, ragtime became the foundation upon which rock 'n roll was established."

"Despite his success, Milne insists that he is still a "saloon piano player," and he credits his early days in those steamy places for teaching him "how to read his audience and move them with [this] richly varied music, tailored [on the spot] to

the mood of the moment." And, he adds with a smile, he and his kind have survived the years because the first rule in those old saloons and barrel bars, where whiskey flowed and violence was routine, was: Don't shoot the piano player."

BOB SEELEY

Detroiter Bob Seeley is a major league piano player like Lou Whitaker was a ballplayer. This still-vigorous pianist was a fixture at the piano bar at Charley's Crab in Troy, MI, where he entertained the locals and visiting dignitaries for over 32 years. It isn't just that he's an extraordinary pianist. He's an

outstanding performer who has played Carnegie Hall several times and most of the major venues throughout Europe for several years. He is universally hailed as possibly the greatest proponent of boogie-woogie and stride alive today.

Bob Seeley has seen the three greatest players of the era perform personally - Albert Ammons, Pete Johnson, Meade Lux Lewis, and recreates for us their compositions and style of playing. Bob says he may possibly be the last pianist alive today that meets the above condition. But Seeley has also said that it's the Boogie-Woogie music that keeps

you young. Proof enough!

From Bob Seeley's Biography:

Styles played: Classic Boogie Woogie, Harlem Stride, Ragtime, American Songbook Ballads

Quotes: "Best Boogie Woogie piano player on the Planet" (Dick Hyman, master jazz pianist)

Performances: Carnegie Hall NYC (3 times). Concerts in 12 European countries. Detroit Boogie-Woogie Festival (3 times). Various USA Music Festivals - dozens of times.


Charley's Crab Restaurant - 32 years! (Closed 2010). Birdland Jazz Club - NYC. Baker's Keyboard Lounge -

Detroit. Ted's Restaurant - Bloomfield Hills. Old Mill - Waterford.

In summary, Bob Milne and Bob Seeley are Detroit colleagues and good friends. In many regards, these are among the last men standing who held first hand friendships with significant American ragtime and boogie-woogie composers and historians.

Put on your toe-tapping shoes, stoke up with some popcorn, and sit down at the Senate Theater for an exhilarating afternoon of original American music.
