TOS Grant to Support Wurlitzer Restoration

A \$5,254 grant from the American Theater Organ Society Endowment Fund will support continuing restoration of the DTOS Fisher/Orbits Wurlitzer Organ.

The grant was announced in a July letter from Tim Needler, chairman of the ATOS Endowment Fund.

N e e d l e r w r o t e : "Congratulations! In response to your grant request, \$5,254 for your offset chests repair, trem and reservoir rebuilds has been awarded by the ATOS Endowment Fund Board of Trustees and approved by the ATOS Board of Directors at its recent annual meeting in Atlanta, GA."

The grant requires that an established organ service company be responsible for the work. Scott Smith Pipe Organs of Lansing has been contracted to perform the work.

The Restoration Continues

Concurrent with the cessation of operations at the Senate Theatre in 2009, Scott Smith Pipe Organs and Holden Pipe Organs ceased the releathering process that was well underway. Lacking a clear direction at that time, the decision was made that whatever releathering remained would continue after the organ was totally disassembled and in storage awaiting a new home. The doors of the theatre were closed to nearly all for almost a year-and-a-half, and during that void, members of the Organ Committee kept a watchful eye on the organ, being sure that humidifiers were being filled regularly and that there were no building issues that affected the organ negatively.

Thankfully, operations began again in May, 2011 and here we are, two years hence back in full operation. That having been said, the organ's aging leather has received only temporary patching during that time while funding was being secured to continue the releathering process. It is our pleasure to inform you that funding has been secured from two sources to continue! DTOS board member Paul Jacyk has donated a substantial amount toward organ restoration in recent months, and more recently, a grant has been awarded to DTOS from the American Theatre Organ Society. This is specifically for the restoration of several bass offset chests, regulators and tremolos.

Work is expected to begin immediately and will likely be completed by year's

end. While this does not complete the releathering, it puts us a long way toward a completely restored instrument. Many thanks to Paul, ATOS and continued support from members and other donors alike!

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usic Preservation Project

In November of last year, your Board of Directors created a new Policy that created the position of Music Archivist and appointed Christopher Dengate to the position.

Over the last several years, concerns regarding our music library containing virtually every concert recorded on our Wurlitzer have been expressed at board meetings with many thoughts on how to store our heritage of music. The library contains over 680 recordings dating back to our first DTOS concert by John Muri in October of 1961.

Currently, the library is stored on three devices with the oldest being on ten inch reel to reel tape. Most of this format of storage has not been backed up to a newer form of storage. Along with being very bulky to store, due to age, the tapes have become fragile. The original machine used to record these concerts is still in the hands of the Society but is also showing its age with very few technicians that know how to repair it.

Another format of storage currently in place at DTOS is DAT. A much smaller and easier format to store, the blank DAT tapes are becoming harder to find according to DTOS audio engineer Fred Bruflodt. The DAT format was put into place in the early 1990's and we have roughly thirty years of music on this format as well.

The last format currently in place is CDR or compact disc. This format is also very easy to store and another advantage to this type of storage is the ease in making "high speed" copies of concerts while the other two need to be copied in "real time". Some progress has been made in transferring the DAT recordings onto CDR as well as reel to reel recordings onto CDR but more needs to be done.

The newest form of storage being introduced in 2013 is onto an SD card. Very similar to ones used in your digital camera at home, it enables DTOS to record and store a entire year of concerts on a single card. This type of format will be replacing the older DAT recordings and the organization will continue to utilize the CDR format.

Everyone has heard of the old saying of not putting all your eggs in one basket. Well, DTOS will no longer be keeping just one copy of our library at the Senate. During the upgrading of the storage formats, a new external hard drive will be put into place to store all of our concerts which will not be kept at the Senate but at another location.

Funding for the new equipment has been approved and ordered by the Board of Directors. A budget of \$2,500 has been al-

lowed for the project which not only covers the cost of equipment but includes money for blank SD cards and other supplies.

We want to make it clear that no attempts will be made to enhance or edit any of the recordings that DTOS has in its library. The object is to transfer the library as recorded to an up to date device as well as having another copy of the library at a separate location which will protect us from fire, theft and flooding.

This project will prove to be a very time consuming one because of the need to transfer the music in real time as previously mentioned. We have over 680 concerts in the library with each concert being roughly two hours in length. If you do the math, that's close to 1,400 hours of our heritage and history being preserved.

And of course a very special thank you to Marvin Spear who made all of this possible.






