Justin Stahl is a native of Beech Grove, Indiana. Beginning at age five with the encouragement of his great-grandfather, Justin was mostly self-taught in piano and organ. His passion for music has reached many venues that have included accompanying for several choral departments, contributing as his church's music director, playing for community theatre, and serving for over ten years in the Indiana National Guard Band.

Justin has most recently entertained thousands of patrons of the Indianapolis Symphony Orchestra in the last two productions of their annual Yuletide Celebration, playing the 3/24 Wurlitzer installed at the Hilbert Circle Theatre. He is also honored to be house organist for the Warren Performing Arts Center on the 3/18 Barton for several pre-show concerts and other events throughout the year. A graduate of Marian University with a Bachelor's degree in piano performance, Justin recently attained his teaching license with hopes of teaching high school choir. Continued work with Martin Ellis is enabling him to advance his aspirations as a theatre organist. Justin's approach and philosophy includes the continued promotion of the theatre organ by using a wide base of genres.

Justin will be a featured performer for the 2014 convention of the American Theatre Organ Society in Indianapolis.

osferatu Accompanied Live at the Senate

The Detroit Theater Organ Society is pleased to present a Halloween silent movie thriller at the Senate Theater. Stephen Warner will be at the Wurlitzer Theater Pipe Organ providing live accompaniment the silent epic, Nosferatu.

Stephen Warner is the organist at Jefferson Avenue Presbyterian Church in Detroit and a staff organist at the Michigan Theater in Ann Arbor. He grew up in Traverse City, Michigan, where he studied piano from age seven and participated in almost every facet of the Traverse City Public Schools music program.

In 2003, Mr. Warner completed dual bachelor's degree in organ performance and in mechanical engineering at the University of Michigan. There, he had the opportunity to play the organ with many of the bands, orchestras and choirs, including the U of M Men's Glee Club, which he was a member for six years. He studied organ primarily with Dr. James Kibbie and piano with Dr. Louis Nagel.

Mr. Warner studied engineering primarily due to his interest in organ building. He has had the privilege of working as an intern for John Brombaugh and Associates in Eugene, Oregon and now is an assistant for the Holden Pipe Organ Company in Ferndale, Michigan. Recently, Mr. Warner was awarded the David L. Junchen Technical Scholarship from the American Theater Organ Society. The summer of 2001 provided him with a unique study of the organ through a program called "Summer In French Organ Studies," sponsored





by the University of North Texas and the Bedient Pipe Organ Company. This program provided opportunities to perform on and learn the technical details of historic French instruments. This program has inspired Mr. Warner to consider a similar dual approach to studying the history of American instruments, particularly those of the 1920's. The current application of this interest is in the creation of a fully illustrated book describing the function and design of Jefferson Avenue Presbyterian's Skinner Organ. For this project, Mr. Warner has received the support of the Organ Historical Society through the awarding of the Mader Memorial Research Scholarship.

Recently, Mr. Warner has enjoyed collaboration with his wife, Rose, singing with him in performances on both the classical and theater organ. He has also collaborated with long-time friend and saxophonist, Adam Olson, in recording and performing the works of vaudeville virtuoso, Rudy Wiedoeft. In recent years, his performance focus has also turned to accompanying silent films.

Mr. Warner lives in Southfield, Michigan with his wife Rose and stepdaughter, Mallory.

unning An Event At the Senate

By now, you have read and heard several times that there is a need for more volunteers at the Senate. This couldn't be more true, and it also couldn't be more mundane to hear this over and over. But I also want to let you know just some of the things that have to happen to make an event happen at the Senate Theater. Be it an organ concert, a movie presentation, or a rental, many things have to happen to make the event run successfully. Currently, there is a small core of people making everything happen at the Senate, and we need more so that we don't get "burnt out!"

All events start at the Board meeting. Be it a movie or a rental, or the scheduled organ concerts, all events get approved at the Board meeting.

After the approval, the tickets need to be done. Is it a reserved seating event or a general admission? What do the tickets need to say? Either way, they need to be set up and printed and made available. Ticket sellers and ticket takers are also needed. That right there is already five people involved.

Can't have a show at the theater without getting the show put up on the marquee. Someone has to pull the letters down from the last show, figure out what letters are needed for the next show, pull those, and then put everything back up on the marquee.

People won't know about the show unless some

type of advertising is distributed to the various sources. There can be over 100 different e-mails and letters sent out to announce a show. Some shows also have flyers that are made and distributed, and some are made larger with posters. Those posters then have to be printed and put out.

Staging the event is a process that involves many people, depending on the event. Is it an organ concert? If so, the organ crew comes in and makes sure the Wurlitzer is in tip-top shape. Then there is the rehearsal time, which requires someone to come in with the artists to help the artists out as needed. This could be up to six or more people helping out here. Is it a movie being shown? The projector needs to be set up and tested. The movie itself needs to be ready to go. If a live show is being done, then the stage needs cleared and set up for them. Lighting also needs to be done for each event, so someone needs to be manning the light board up in the projection booth. Someone is also needed to man the sound board so that everyone can be heard over the sound system. These positions can take up to six more people, if not more!

Back to the "front of the house" or, as it is known in regular language, the lobbies. Before we open to the public, we need to make sure that the change is distributed to each station (box offices, concessions, 50/50 raffle, record counter). Also, the treasurer needs to make sure that we have change ready to go for when it is needed. The concession stand wouldn't be ready to go unless it is full of tasty popcorn! Candy, pop, and coffee are also needed to have everything ready for the patrons. The concession stand can have anywhere from three to six people working it.

Are the theatre areas The main floor clean? (almost 800 seats!) needs to be checked and cleaned before and after each show. The lobby areas also need cleaned. And don't forget the restrooms. Someone has to clean and stock them with their much-needed supplies. This just doesn't happen. This can take a crew of anywhere from one to twenty to get done! Add the two people that work the 50/50 counter, and the two or three that help out at the record counter, as well as someone to play the lobby piano before the show, and you can see that we already have a full crew working a performance.

Another major item that

happens after each event is the balancing of the money. Everything has to get counted, the drawers need to be put back to their original starting amount, with the correct change in place for the next event. Then, everything else needs to get to the bank. Sometimes that can take over an hour to get everything done just at the bank!

All of this sounds daunting, but it happens with every event at the Senate. With the dedication of those over the years, these items, and more, have happened in the background, without most of the people even thinking about it. Now, we would like <u>you</u> to think about it!






H die Teevin
