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cott Foppiano Returns

The 2016 concert series for the Detroit Theater Organ Society kicks off with a familiar face, Scott Foppiano.

Scott Foppiano was born in Memphis, Tennessee in 1965. He began private study of piano and organ at an early age and, while a student in the Parish School of St. Paul the Apostle. During his years at Christian Brothers High School he discovered the Mighty Wurlitzer theatre pipe organ at Memphis' Orpheum Theatre and was soon featured playing overtures and intermissions.

Upon his family's relocation to Charlotte following his senior year he began formal study of the organ and Church Music as entered the NC School of the Arts. He holds a BM, MMus and both the Service Playing and Colleague certifications of the American Guild of Organists. He studied organ improvisation with the late Gerre Hancock at St. Thomas Episcopal Church Fifth Avenue in New York City continued private study of the organ in theatre and symphonic organ stylings with his best friend and mentor the late, great Thomas Hazleton who for twelve years, serve as the assistant to the great Dr. Richard Purvis at Grace Cathedral in San Francisco.



Critically acclaimed and sought after as a recitalist, theatre organist and silent film accompanist he has played and recorded some of the greatest pipe organs in the world and to date has recorded eight digital solo organ CD's with future projects pending. He has been a featured artist for regional and national conventions of the AGO, the Organ Historical Society and the American Theatre Organ Society, all of which he has served as a member of the administrative boards at both local and national levels. He has served as Organist and Director of Music for several prominent congregations including a National Shrine. Additionally, he been very involved as an adjudicator for the ATOS' Young Organist Competition.

In addition to his ecclesiastical duties Mr. Foppiano maintains a very active schedule as a solo performer. During the national convention in New York City in July 2007, he was honored with the title "A.T.O.S. Organist of the Year" which included his performing a solo organ recital on the historic organ in the great Cadet Chapel of the U.S. Military Academy at West Point.

ombination Action Releathering Project



The Board of Directors au-


thorized Stephen Warner to start work on one of the four combination machines that are located in the back corner of the relay room. That work has started, and if you have been in to play the organ lately, you will notice that 1/4 of the pistons on the console currently do not work. There is a great reason for this, and some of that is pictured here. The work on the first combination action machine will be reinstalled before the March concert, with the hope that the next machine will be worked on afterwards.

To date we have received donations to cover approximately half of the project. Any help that you can provide to complete this project is greatly appreciated.
