The Detroit Theater Organ Society is pleased to welcome back Martin Ellis to the Senate Theater stage.

Martin Ellis holds the distinction of being the first winner of the ATOS Young Organists Competition in 1986. After his initial exposure to theatre organ at the Paramount Music Palace in Indianapolis at seven years old, Ellis began organ studies in the sixth grade, and at fifteen began studies with John Ferguson. Upon winning the ATOS competition, he premiered with Rex Koury at the Chicago Theatre Wurlitzer that year, and was featured in concert at the ATOS National Convention the following year in Richmond, Va.

Ellis entered DePauw University in Greencastle, IN, majoring in keyboard performance and composition, which would prove to serve him well in future endeavors. The Central Indiana Chapter of ATOS was extremely supportive, engaging Martin in performances regionally throughout his college years. After winning the local AGO competition, he was the runner-up in the AGO Region V competition. During his senior year, he served as the weekend artist at Milwaukee's Piper Music Palace, as an alternate organist at the Pipes and Pizza in Lansing, Ill., and performed



concerts in and around the Chicago area.

Ellis accepted the prestigious position of Assistant Organist/Choirmaster at Second Presbyterian Church (Indiana's largest church) under Robert Shepfer, playing the 4/81 Aeolian-Skinner pipe organ from 1990-1998. Though established as a fine classical concert artist and church musician performing internationally at such places as Westminster Abbey in London, Ellis continued to be an active featured theatre organist for CIC-ATOS and on the Long Center Organ Series in Lafayette, Indiana.

With extraordinary sight-

musically adapt to a variety of situations, Ellis was invited to be the fourth member of the Trio con Brio by Donna Parker, Jonas Nordwall and Tom Hazleton. He performed for the Dickinson Theatre Organ Society and Fort Wayne's Embassy Theatre when Tom was unable to perform, and was ready to step in and play any of the other member's parts as the understudy, definitely the toughest job of the three!

Ellis worked for Rodgers Instrument Corporation, spearheading the MIDI implementation with church music with Donna and Jonas. He moved to Portland, Oregon and continued his work with Rodgers, as reading skills and the ability to well as serving as Music Direc-

tor/Organist at St. James Lutheran Church in downtown Portland. Theatre organ came into play again as he served as an associate organist at Uncle Milt's Pipe Organ Pizza in Vancouver, WA, and played for the local organ clubs. Returning to Indianapolis, Martin became the Senior Staff Pianist/Organist for the Indianapolis Children's Choir-a touring organization with more than 2,000 children! Their tours have taken them through most major cities in Europe and Canadaincluding playing an organ

concert on the Tambourini organ at St. Peter's Basilica in Rome. They have appeared on several major TV networks and ESPN. He became the staff arranger and orchestrator for the ICC organization and has many published choral and orchestra arrangements with Hal Leonard and Colla Voce publishing companies. He recently orchestrated fifteen pieces that were performed and recorded with the Moscow Chamber Orchestra and ICC. For seven years, Martin has concurrently served as Artistic Assistant/Pianist for the Pacific Rim Children's Choir Festival in Honolulu, Hawaii.

Martin maintains an active concert schedule and has become a prominent face among the large church scene and orchestra scene in Indianapolis. He frequently is featured as a keyboard artist with a variety of venues including performances of the Saint-Saens Organ Symphony with the Indianapolis Symphony Orchestra and the Poulenc Organ Concerto with the Carmel Symphony Orchestra. He has appeared on the Ohio Theatre's summer movie series for several years.

In 2004, Martin was appointed the Associate Director of Music and Organist at North United Methodist Church in Indianapolis playing the restored 4/76 Kimball orchestral pipe organ. He also became the third permanent member of the Trio con Brio upon Tom Hazleton's passing something Tom, Jonas and Donna agreed upon when the trio was formed.

Join us on Sunday afternoon, May 15 for an enjoyable afternoon of music at the Senate. We look forward to seeing you there.



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Blast from the Past

I received a phone call from a friend of mine from work inquiring about the Senate Theater and the possibility of visiting there one day. I of course said absolutely. Any chance to show off the theater and the marvelous organ, I'm in. As it turns out, she grew up three blocks away and her first job was, in fact, at the Senate Coney Island next door. We arranged to meet on a Saturday, and I met this gentleman, Jim Watson, and his sister-in-law Joan Watson. (My friend's uncle and mother). I gave them a private tour of the theater and of course showed off the organ. As it turns out, Jim was the ticket taker during the late forties and early fifties here at the Senate Theater. He is pictured to the right at his old post.

He and Joan tell me that the Senate Theater was quite the hopping place during that time. The day would begin by visiting the candy shop next door or to the "Better Made" potato chip outlet on the corner of Gilbert and Michigan. (Currently "Swans" income tax service). Joan got her first set of dishes from the theater as a promotional gimmick. The promotion was that for each visit you would receive one piece until you completed your set. Joan met her future husband, Jim's brother, at the theater as well. She and her brother Jim both told me that there was in fact a balcony at the theater at one time. There were three rows in what is now the ladies lounge. The rows looked through a single piece of glass that ran the entire length of the lounge and was a good place to take noisy children and babies.

They both had great stories about the Theaters past.

Since the establishment of the Organization, a policy has been in place allowing the playing membership to bring in their own recording devices and record the concerts on their personal machines for their listening pleasure. The organization reserved the last row in the auditorium (commonly known as the recording row) for these members to connect their machines into the house system to record.

From the start of the Organization, it was a very popular thing to do. Many playing members would haul their reel to reel machines in which later turned into cassette tape decks and then to Compact Disc Recorders once a month to record the show. Many of

these recordings are still in their procession. It was not until the last 10 years or so that we have noticed the number of members recording the show dwindling down to just a handful. We now offer the playing members a CD of the concert for \$10 at the record counter for those that wish to purchase it.

Some changes are coming to the recording row during the summer. All of the old wiring that provided the members with the "feed" from the house system will be removed. In addition, the center section of the recording row will take on a new look with improvements to the area that the person running the mixer sits. A level platform will replace about 5-6 seats in the center of the center equipment needed for the PA the projection booth. An opening in the wall behind the recording row will allow access to this new platform from the hallway outside the offices on organization, donations will be the main floor.


