### ummer Projects Abound

This summer is proving to be a busy time at the Senate Theater. Many projects have started, or will be starting soon.

Back in June, problems started developing with the electric fuse panel located in the relay room. Shortly after that, problems started developing in the fuse panel in the closet at the rear of the auditorium. After talking with and bringing in a team of electricians, it was determined that the best solution to the problems was to replace the panels. This was done in July. When the work was started, it was found that several fuses had melted in their sockets. Also, the panel in the relay room was never grounded. After fixing those issues, and a few others, the new breaker panel is installed and working great. This project is now done, at a cost of \$3,374,34.

The next project that has started is the construction of a new sound and light booth at the rear of the auditorium. A new booth is being constructed so that all lighting and sound controls will be in one location. This will make it easier and more inviting for rentals and concerts to use our equipment. The back wall has already been removed so that an entrance to the booth will be from the back of the fover. The floor will be built up to be level, and the booth will be set up with places for the sound board and light-



ing control boards. To further make this project work, a new sound cable cluster, also known as a snake, will be installed that will run from the stage, down into the tunnel and to the back of the auditorium into the new booth. Provisions are also being made for the eventual new installation of speakers so that we can bring back showing movies once we have the marquee re-installed. This project has a budget that will be around \$5,000.

The restroom down near the stage has an interesting problem. Those that have used this facility may have noticed that the floor is not exactly stable! It seems that the sub structure of the restroom is starting to fail. In order to fix this problem, all fixtures in the restroom will be removed, the old floor and sub structure will be removed, and a new, stronger, more durable sub structure will be erected. Once done, new flooring will be installed, and all fixtures put back in their place. This project is expected to take a long weekend to complete, Dave Calendine Treasurer, DTOS

and will be starting shortly. The cost of this project is yet to be determined, but by doing this project in-house (thanks to Joan Brown) the cost will be minimal.

The marquee project is moving on to the next phase. Work has been completed on new ironwork to hold up the existing "SENATE" sign. Next time you are at the theatre, you will notice that the poles that were added and bolted to the sidewalk are The construction now gone. workers also cleaned up some of the old iron girders that were sticking out where the old reader panels were installed. We are now moving on to the design stage of the new marquee. Total cost of the marquee project will be over \$150,000, if not more!

Ceiling repairs will be done soon in the men's restroom upstairs. A persistent leak is perplexing the roofer, and is still being worked on. A persistent leak in the east wall of the auditorium is also rearing its ugly head, and investigative work is still being done on that problem.

There are other projects that will be done besides these, and like all things at the theatre, these projects cost money.

Concerts resume from their summer break, with Dave Calendine taking the bench to present "Music of the Mouse—Music from the Walt Disney


Songbook" on Sunday, September 11 at 3:00 p.m.
