


# ark Herman and Anthony Snitker

Sunday, December 3, 2017 3:00p.m.

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We end the year with a wonderful Christmas concert with Mark Herman at the Mighty Wurlitzer. Joining Mark will be singer Anthony Snitker.

Born in 1987, Mark Herman is one of America's busiest young theatre organists, performing over 30 concerts and silent film presentations each year across the US and abroad. In 2012, he was named the American Theatre Organ Society's Organist of the Year and is the youngest person ever to receive the prestigious honor. Previously, he was overall winner of the Society's Young Theatre Organist Competition in 2004.

He studied theatre organ with the late John Ferguson of Indianapolis, who was recognized worldwide for his skills teaching the art of the theatre organ. His classical piano studies were with Christine Freeman of Fort Wayne, Indiana. He earned a Bachelor of Fine Arts degree in Theatre Arts/Management from De-Paul University in Chicago.

Mark has been featured on several episodes of American Public Media's Pipedreams program, and has performed for countless conventions of the American Theatre Organ Society, American Guild of Organists, and Organ Historical Society. On the international stage, he has

toured in Australia, New Zealand, Switzerland, and the United Kingdom.

He currently resides in Los Angeles, where he is President and Tonal Director of the Los Angeles Organ Company, the Allen Organ dealer for the Greater Los Angeles Area. He is in demand as a voicing specialist and tonal consultant for Allen Organs and is proud to be an Allen Artist, showcasing new Allen Organs in the US and beyond.

A native of the small river town of McGregor, Iowa, Anthony now resides in Pasadena, California. He graduated from Columbia College Chicago in 2010 with a BFA in Musical Theatre. Anthony has appeared in many shows and is active performer in the Indianapolis theatre scene. Some of his favorite past roles include Claude in Hair, Melchoir in Spring Awakening, Huck Finn in Big River, Jack in Stephen Sondheim's Into the Woods, Man 2 in Songs for a New World, and Hero in A Funny Thing Happened on the Way to the Forum. Besides singing and acting, Anthony is also a dancer. His experience ranges in many styles of dance including tap, swing, jazz, ballet, modern, and contact improvisation. He has performed extensively with Mark Herman for audi-





ences across the United States, Australia, and New Zealand.

The doors to the Senate will open at 2:00 p.m., with the concert starting at 3:00 p.m. Our intermission will be extended as we bring back the ever-popular Christmas Cookie desserts for intermission.

We will be hosting a holiday decorating party at the theater on November 25th at 2pm.



## s Good As New Again

It's been a busy time down at our old Senate Theater the last few months. The building was built in 1926 by architect Christian W. Brandt, and it has started to show its age, but fear not. As Peter Allen wrote, "Everything old is new again". Well not really, just the east side exterior of the building.

As many of you know there has been a moisture problem for many years rearing its ugly head on the east auditorium wall. After a lot of investigation, research, and trial and error, it was determined that the problem lied with the foundation and masonry below grade. What was happening was that every time it rained, water was seeping in through the wall and into the tunnel that runs the length of the Theater along the east wall. Thanks to the efforts of member Chris Dengate, a firm was hired to excavate several feet down and explore as to what exactly was going on. As a result, it was found that the

foundation to the Theater was in exceptional condition, however the masonry that goes a few feet below grade was in serious need of help. Water was literally rushing in.


The company that was hired recommended tarring the entire area, placing a membrane, and then a protective foam to protect the membrane. In addition, it was recommended that a new edge drain be installed that runs the length of the building

from door to door.

All this work was completed and now the water has been forbidden from entering the Theater. This was a necessary and rather expensive project so if you would like to help us pay for it please consider making a donation. Your donation is tax deductible. Thank you for your support.
